

Superintendent Says...

We blinked, and just like that, 2025 is behind us, and January 2026 is already gone. February brings colder weather, carnival season, and the reminder that spring is just around the corner. Unfortunately, Mother Nature tends to deliver the bulk of winter right now, so it's important we remain vigilant.

First, protect yourself from hypothermia. Parades and outdoor activities increase the risk of cold-related injuries. Dress appropriately for the temperature and be mindful of how long you are exposed to the cold.

Second, home heating safety, especially portable heaters. By this point in the season, it's easy to become comfortable and let our guard down. Maintain a safe distance, at least three feet from curtains, bedding, and furniture. Never use extension cords, and never leave heaters on when you leave your home.

Third, cooking safety remains a major concern. Unattended cooking can quickly fill a home with smoke or cause serious fire damage. Outdoor cooking devices such as BBQ pits should never be placed near structures, under coverings, or out of the wind close to the home, as this creates a serious fire hazard.

Fourth, smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms. These devices can truly mean the difference between life and death. Every home should have working alarms. The Office of State Fire Marshal's Operation Save-A-Life program provides free smoke alarms, and as the Fire Service, we must champion this effort. Educate all personnel to become proficient in installing these devices. Homes with electricity need smoke alarms; homes with gas appliances or heating systems must have carbon monoxide alarms. Carbon monoxide is a silent killer, colorless, odorless, and it binds to hemoglobin far faster than oxygen.

Most importantly, our goal is keeping everyone safe. Simple preventative measures save lives. Let's make 2026 the year we reach more people than ever through the Operation Save-A-Life program and reduce these entirely preventable losses.

Military Rope/Confined Space Rescue - Jan. 12-15



- The Civil Support Team Rope and Confined Space Rescue course is a hands-on program focused on developing technical rescue skills in rope and confined space environments. Training emphasizes knot tying, rappelling, pickoffs, line transfers, patient packaging, and team-based scenarios, with instruction tailored to each unit's abilities to enhance readiness and teamwork.

Rope Rescue Operations - January 20-23



- The Rope Rescue Operations course prepares responders to conduct high- and low-angle rescues using rope systems for patient access, packaging, and extraction. Training includes anchors, lowering and belay systems, dual tension and mechanical advantage systems, as well as hazard identification and support of technician-level operations.

- The Fire Officer I course covers leadership and supervision, personnel management, incident command basics, safety and risk management, public relations, and fire prevention awareness.

Participants will develop lesson plans and deliver class presentations. 

- **Course Title:** Fire Investigator
- **Course Details:** This course prepares entry-level investigators to conduct fire and explosion investigations using NFPA 921 and the scientific method, in alignment with NFPA 1033 standards. Topics include fire science, fire patterns, building and fuel gas systems, legal considerations, and investigation administration. Successful participants will be recommended to take the Fire Investigator certification exam through the Louisiana Firefighter and Emergency Responder Certification Program.

FETA Recruit Academy 190

FETA Recruit Academy 190 is underway with a class of 32 recruits. The 18-week academy began on January 12, 2026, and will conclude with graduation on May 1, 2026.

The recruits come from 12 Louisiana fire departments: Baker, Bogalusa, Central, Crowley, DeSoto Parish, Hahnville, Morgan City, New Iberia, Opelousas, St. John, St. Tammany, and West Baton Rouge. During the academy, they will take part in challenging physical and classroom training that prepares them for the realities of the fire service.

The program emphasizes hands-on skills, teamwork, and responsibility, ensuring recruits are ready to respond safely and effectively in emergency situations. Upon graduation, these recruits will return to their home departments prepared to serve their communities and help save lives.

Tools of the Training

FireVent Mobile Ventilation Prop

The FireVent mobile ventilation prop provides a realistic, versatile training platform for practicing critical fireground skills in a controlled environment that simulates residential and commercial operations. Firefighters can train on flat and pitched roof operations, including ladder placement, ladder-to-roof transitions, body positioning, footing, and coordinated movement.

The prop supports comprehensive vertical ventilation training, allowing crews to practice saw operations, proper cutting techniques, tool control, and coordinated team work. Firefighters can safely gain repeated experience with chainsaws, rotary saws, and hand tools such as hooks and axes, building confidence, reinforcing safety, and improving efficiency.

Overall, the FireVent prop enhances firefighter readiness by offering repeatable, hands-on training in roof safety, ventilation, tool proficiency, and coordinated fireground operations in a mobile, realistic setting.


